ENDING SENSELESS EUTHANASIA

Over 85,000 dogs and cats are euthanized in Georgia every year due to pet overpopulation.

This number only accounts for the recorded intakes and does not include the largely rural areas of the state that have little or no access to animal controls, shelters, rescues and veterinarians.



Fix Georgia Pets (FGP) provides funding for low-cost spay/neuter to address pet overpopulation at the root cause.

WORKING STATEWIDE

FGP supports multiple projects
throughout the state. Emphasis on
giving goes to targeted areas with high
recorded euthanasia rates and rural
areas with limited or no resources.

To date, excluding statewide Spay
Days, FGP has strategically assisted
over 1/3 of the state, serving 62
counties. But the work is not complete
until lifesaving resources are a reality
for every community.

AREAS OF FOCUS

FGP focuses on supporting urban areas with high recorded euthanasia rates and rural areas with limited or no resources.

Two priority areas for FGP are Richmond County (Augusta) which has the highest recorded euthanasia rate in the state and to groups in Southwest GA that serve multiple counties, including counties with no animal control or other resources.

#SPAYTOGETHER

COVID-19 shutdowns caused a backlog of spay/neuter surgeries. FGP responded by leveraging a match with the nationwide #SpayTogether coalition to increase the funding earmarked for Georgia. This partnership resulted in \$40,000 for Georgia and provided for 1,787 spay/neuter surgeries.





GOING FURTHER

In addition to financial support, FGP has provided over 400 crates and over 5,000 water bowls to our partner groups for spay/neuter and rescue transport.
